Some members of DLCRA formed a Regeneration Group that has been organising community clean-ups around the town since late summer this year. We are trying to find more people across the town who want to help improve our communal spaces.

This is our town and there is a responsibility on all who live and work here to do all they can to make the environment that we share a welcoming, beautiful and sustainable town. If people took some responsibility for the outside of their own homes or businesses and worked together on their own streets Dun Laoghaire could be the best town in the county.

The clean-ups involve sweeping pavements, removing weeds from the gutters and litter collection. Dirt accumulating beside the road causes grasses and weeds to grow there which catch more dirt and dust. The grasses and weeds grow through the tarmacadam and damage the road surface which results in having to be repaired by the Council.

The Council has recently invested in new composters to deal with the increased amount of green waste they are receiving from community groups. So those of you who are environmentally minded can be assured that the weeds will be put to good recycling use. So far, we have

cleaned-up Northumberland Ave, Corrig Park, Mulgrave Street, Library Road, Cross Ave, Convent Road, Crofton Terrace, Tivoli Road East, Mellifont Ave, Clarinda Park East, Bentley Villas and Georges Street.

Tidy Towns

These clean-ups have highlighted the scale of the work needed. After much consideration, we propose that Dun Laoghaire should have its own Tidy Towns Committee. A Tidy Towns group is the best way to do the necessary work.



The Results of the DLCRA Survey

Residents told us what they're concerned about ...



As our first public initiative we ran a questionnaire across the centre of the town, assessing the residents' view of the positive and negative aspects of the town and their ideas on what could be done to improve it. We were very pleased with around 350 responses and a wealth of interesting and constructive ideas. We would like to thank everyone who took the time to share their thoughts with us! The results of this survey have been key in shaping the focus areas for our group.

The main issues raised centred on the retail environment, appearance/cleanliness of the streets, general feelings of neglect and a range of parking issues were also highlighted.


Over 71% of written comments mentioned that they loved the sea, pier or harbour when discussing the town. Other aspects highlighted were the unique heritage, culture and history of our town.

There was also a wealth of proposals that could benefit Dun Laoghaire such as activities like Entente Florale, Open Garden days, promoting more living over the shop to bring life back into the town.

We are working on many of these issues and ideas. We have been in contact with all the County Councillors regarding our initiative. You can increase the urgency of issues by contacting the councillors personally about these and other issues of concern to you, for example, car parking in the commercial areas of the town or dog fouling on pavements.

We would encourage areas to form their own residents associations. We can help and assist you to do this. We can give advice on communicating effectively with DLRCC. We can also assist with organising things like cleanups, and environmental initiatives like toolsharing and wildflower bee-bombs.
